## Animals and their Young

Pupils had a wonderful time on our recent visit to Cannon Hall Farm. We had a look at all the animals, many of them had just had babies. We were able to feed some of the sheep, lambs, cows, calves, pigs and piglets. The pupils thought it was funny when they saw some of the lambs and kids (baby goats) jump around on top of anything they could to get closer. Pupils were very quick to point out that the pigs were very smelly!

We went on a tractor ride and saw lots of llamas in a field. The farmer on the tractor told us that we had to be careful not to get too close to them because they spit at people when they are afraid.

We watched the sheep race. Everyone cheered as they ran as fast as they could to the finish line. The one we wanted to win, Elvis, came last unfortunately.

We all loved the reptile house. We saw some working ants. It was incredible to see them carrying leaves on their backs to their anthill. We were amazed! We also saw huge snakes, boggle eyed chameleons, impressive iguanas and terrific tortoises. This was an amazing start for our 'Animals and their young' topic this term.













## **Enrichment**

Some of the pupils in secondary enjoyed a picnic in the sun as part of their enrichment course. They had picnic food and played games.



#### **Our Earth**

In upper Key Stage 2, pupils have been learning about our Earth, including mountains and volcanoes. To understand how a volcano is formed, they did an experiment - pupils looked at where it erupted and added a layer each time. When they cut the volcano open, you could see all of the layers of volcanic rock that formed the shape of the volcano.





### **Crucial Crew**

One of our primary classes attended the Crucial Crew at the Lifewise Centre in Rotherham. Pupils had the chance to practice getting on and off the bus (making sure to thank the driver), learned where people stand in a magistrates court, discussed online safety, practiced what to do in the event of a fire at home and had a go at crossing the road, making sure they check for cars, even if the green man is showing. We then had a picnic lunch in a local park and had a well earned play on the swings!

All the pupils really enjoyed the day and have been telling everyone at school the important safety facts they learned.
